In her free time she enjoys camping, kayaking, swimming and spending time with her husband, Patrick McKee, DVM, and their three children, three horses and three dogs.


Reception Staff


What's the deal with heartworm disease...

The Facts: Heartworm disease is a serious, and potentially fatal disease, transmitted to dogs by mosquitos and can even be transmitted by infected wild animals such as foxes and coyotes. Three months after being infected with heartworm larvae from an infected mosquito, the larvae mature into worms and enter the bloodstream, and travel to the heart. This causes severe damage to the heart, lungs, and other organs, as well as lung disease, and heart failure in later stages.

In the early stages, heartworm disease generally does not show any symptoms. As the disease progresses, and the worms grow and multiply, signs can include: coughing, a swollen abdomen, and in some severe cases, a blockage may develop in the vessels leading into their heart, which requires immediate surgical removal.

Diagnosis is made by a blood test (usually in office), with confirmation by an outsource lab, followed by a radiograph, to determine the stage of the disease. Heartworm disease can be treated, but it is a very costly and difficult disease to treat.

The best treatment is prevention!



Dr. McKee's Recommendations

After reviewing the safety and efficacy information,

In addition to preventing heartworm disease, Heartgard Plus also contains Pyrantel, which treats and controls Roundworm and Hookworm infections. As with other Merial products, Heartgard Plus comes with their Satisfaction Plus Guarantee.



Trifexis, from Elanco, combines two active ingredients, spinosad and milbemycin oxime to create an "all in one" monthly tablet.

Trifexis prevents heartworm disease, as well as treating and controlling fleas, hookworm, roundworm, and whipworm infections. Trifexis is fast acting, killing fleas in as little as 30 minutes.

It only takes one mosquito bite to contract heartworm disease.

All dogs should be tested annually for heartworm disease, this is usually done as part of the annual wellness exam. Puppies should be started on heartworm prevention as soon as they are old enough, then tested at 6 months and 1 year old, then annually thereafter. If a dose of prevention is given late, or missed, a dog does need to be retested to ensure they have not been infected due to the lapse in preventative.

In the United States, 1 out of 76 dogs test positive for heartworm disease. This rate is even higher in the state of North Carolina at 1 out of 43, due to our warm climate, and mild winters. This translates to 8.25% of all heartworm positive cases in the United States being in North Carolina.

As severe as heartworm disease is, it can only be transmitted by a bite from an infected mosquito. Heartworm disease cannot be transmitted from dog to dog, or from dog to humans.
